Creating meaningful interactions with your child and why they are important.

"Can I fly?", "I can't get them to stay together!", "Mom, why is the ice melting?" "That is mine," "I don't want it" might be some questions and statements you have heard at some point from the little ones in your life. As children explore their environment, the adults in their lives play a critical role in supporting their developing brain. When caregivers are aware of how crucial it is to engage in meaningful interactions with their child, they will take 5-10 minutes a day of absolute and undisturbed time to do so.

Recognizing that daily activities can become "teachable moments" can make a difference in a child's academic success. Children have an innate curiosity, they are continually trying to figure out their surroundings. This curiosity and desire to learn and master new skills are the initial building blocks of lifelong learners. Your daily interactions with your child are vital in helping them learn about the world around them.

A child's brain is 90% developed by the age of 5 years old. As caregivers, you are their first teachers, helping shape their growing brains. Your interactions with them are an important aspect of their development.

Kristan Steward-Henry and Amber Friesen in their article, "Promoting Powerful Interactions Between Parents and Children", share the Powerful Interactions Framework and how it can create opportunities for meaningful learning in everyday activities. You can use these prompts when your child plays with superheroes, or is coloring, building with blocks, playing with dolls or vehicles. You can easily extend these activities by asking questions and allowing your child to explain what they are working on. Allow your child to select activities/toys they enjoy playing with, let them lead the play, and find ways to add to it by expanding their learning. These priceless moments are essential to help shape and develop their growing brains.

Step 1: Be Present

Here are a few prompts you can use to start engaging with your child to create meaningful interactions:

Narrate the process of what you are doing:

"You need a diaper change! Let's get what we will need... Diapers, Wipes, and Cream."

"I need to make dinner; can you help me find the ingredients we need to make pasta?"

As you become increasingly conscious of the importance of meaningful interactions, you can begin to set specific time aside during your day to spend with your child.

Establishing intentional interactions, setting learning goals, and keeping in mind that these are opportunities where you get to know your child, will support your child's development and establish strong emotional connections with them.

Let's not take time for granted; children's brains are sponges, they're continually learning. Take every available opportunity to engage with your child in a give-and-take of ongoing interactions. You would be surprise of what your child is capable of accomplishing.
